



## One Racer's Retreat

Martin Truex Jr.'s Very Own Garage-Mahal

to build a garage and shop on the lakefront property he shares with longtime girlfriend Sherry Pollex and yellow lab Lexi, he wanted a functional outbuilding to store his toys.

"It was going to be just a four-bay garage with storage and a rec room on the second floor," he says. "That's it."


However, once Truex realized be was

free to create something from scratch, the original plans were scrapped.

"As a kid, I had the room my parents let me live in," he says. 'And the only house I've ever bought was already built. This was the first time that I had the opportunity to build something perfect, from the ground up,"

The project's transition from humble man cave to mini-mansion began with the addition of a large bedroom suite and mushroomed to include a gournet kitchen, custom millwork and an integrated entertainment system featuring no fewer than seven flatpanel TVs controlled by a single. universal keypad.

Truex worked closely with masterbuilder Bon Carrolf of Stonebridge Luxury Homes and had a hand in

every facet of the building's design and construction.

When it came to decorating, Truex and Pollex hired NASCAR-driver-turnedinterior-designer, Shawna Robinson. Robinson — who selected every fabric, paint color and piece of furniture as well as art and fixtures — decorated Truex's main house a few years back. Except for a 9-foot fiberglass Captain Morgan statue that Truex added, the decoration is seamless.

Each wall is adorned with tributes to Truex's many passions: hunting, fishing, racing and the Philadelphia Eagles, N

When finished, the first-floor garage space will house Truex's tools and a full workshop for metal- and woodworking in addition to his car (full-size and radio-controlled) projects.



The ceiling beams are not ornamental. They are structural — each hewn from a different tree and hand-carved using a chainsaw for a more rustic effect.
